However, breeding density of pileated woodpeckers was negatively correlated with timber harvest intensity, breeding density of pileated woodpeckers was 81% lower in areas that had received fuel reduction cuts compared to areas with no recent harvest, and breeding density of pileated woodpeckers declined 86% following regeneration cuts.
