Furthermore, the high unemployment rate is the main obstacle identified by rural community members, especially women. The report also demonstrates the interests of rural women in improving their skills in the collection, processing and marketing of non-wood forest products (NWFPs). Consequently, the report shows the importance of improving women's access to information, capacity development and decision-making. It concludes by

emphasizing that NWFPs have strong potential for reducing food insecurity and poverty in the regions of the study, particularly when both women and men are effectively supported.
