As woman's rights activists recognized, citizenship encompassed activities that ranged far beyond specific legal rights for women to their broader terms of inclusion in society, the economy, and government. *Citizenship and the Origins of Women's History in the United States* demonstrates that citizenship is at the heart of women's history and, consequently, that women's history is the history of nations.
